I am an intuitive painter trusting my instincts, my hands. Not having a concept or idea in my mind allows me to explore the surface of the canvas more freely and without any techniques.

Obviously as a painter I am a more visual individual and that might be different from how I see the world compared to others.

What do you hope viewers come away with after seeing your work?

I hope that the viewers simply enjoy looking at my work and that it evokes a positive reaction in them. They might come up with an interpretation of it which is the beauty of abstraction because it
