


The Lost Encyclopedia Drawings (1989-90)































Raw & Cooked (2009)





















The Quaking Aspen (2009-10)




















Sue Johnson (b. 1957, San Francisco, California) earned a BFA in painting from Syracuse University and an MFA in painting from Columbia University with additional study in London, England and Florence, Italy. She has had 34 one-person exhibitions including shows at the Tweed Museum of Art, Jan Cicero Gallery, Brooklyn Botanic Garden, Midwest Museum of American Art, Swarthmore College, John Michael Kohler Art Center, Delaware Center for Contemporary Arts, Munson Williams Proctor Institute, Anderson Gallery/VCU, Carleton College, Emory University, The Rosenbach Museum and Library, and University of Richmond Museums. Her work has been included in curated exhibitions at Artists Space, The Drawing Center, Steibel Modern, Art in General, White Columns, Reyes + Davis Independent Exhibitions, Civilian Art Projects, The Painting Center, Caren Golden Gallery, Katzen Art Center/American University, Worcester Center for Crafts, Lehman College Art Gallery, Wave Hill, Illinois State University, Thread Waxing Space, Bergen Museum of Science and Art, Bard College, Lewis & Clark College, Bennington College, Soho Center for the Visual Arts, and the Indianapolis Museum of Art among others.

Fellowships and grants include awards from the Pollock-Krasner Foundation, the National Endowment for the Arts/Mid Atlantic Foundation, the New Jersey State Council on the Arts, and four Individual Artist Awards from the Maryland State Arts Council. Selected residency fellowships include the Arts/Industry Program at the John Michael Kohler Art Center, Mac Dowell Colony, Millay Colony, Art Omi International Artist Colony, Virginia Center for the Creative Arts, City of Salzburg Kunstlerhaus Residency, American Philosophical Society Andre Michaux Library Research Fellowship, Oberpfalzer Kunstlerhaus in Schwandorf, Germany, and American Antiquarian Society research fellowship. Upcoming individual exhibitions in 2011-13 include an artist project at the Pitt Rivers Museum, University of Oxford, and a large-scale exhibition at the Eleanor D. Wilson Museum at Hollins University. Reviews of her work have appeared in *The New York Times, The Washington Post, The New Art Examiner*, and *Art Papers*.



SUE JOHNSON Then and Now

Since 1995 much has been written about Sue Johnson's ongoing project *The Alternate Encyclopedia*, and major exhibitions have been organized by The Tweed Museum of Art, The McLean Project for the Arts, The Midwest Museum of American Art, Carleton College, and The John Michael Kohler Art Center among other venues.

Then and Now takes a look at art works that predate *The Alternate* Encyclopedia and other concurrent work created on the margins of the project. Primarily works on paper, and including artist books and paintings on industrial materials such as linoleum, these works trace Johnson's long-standing interests in natural history and early science, cabinets of curiosities, pop culture, and the world of advertising. Some works included in this volume have never been shown before. The artist herself forgot one series in particular, now renamed The Lost Encyclopedia Drawings, until they were discovered in a flat file drawer a few years ago.
